

Sunday Celebration of the Word and Communion - Lent

INTRODUCTORY RITE

GATHERING OF THE COMMUNITY

[Welcome one another.

The leader of prayer (L) moves from the front pews to the presiding place.

The priest's chair is empty.

The readers and ministers with candles and incense wait at the entrance.

The community or assembly (A) is gathered]

GATHERING SONG

Stand

L and A: Make the SIGN OF THE CROSS

LITURGICAL GREETING (Lenten p. 42)

L: Blessed be Jesus Christ, who has shown the greatness of his love, by dying for us while we were still sinners. Bless the Father and the Son and Holy Spirit.

A: Blessed be God forever.

INTRODUCTORY REMARKS (p. 206)

L: Today, we, the people of God, gather to hear and respond to God's word, to return praise and thanks, [and to share Christ's sacrament.]

We look forward to that day when we will once more celebrate the Eucharist, as Christ commanded us to do in his memory.

Our community makes its worship in union with the Church throughout the world, with N. our Pope, N. our bishop, our pastor, Father N., who is unable to be with us, and with our brothers and sisters in neighbouring

parishes who keep holy this day in the celebration of the Lord's sacrifice and supper.

OPENING RITE

(Lent: use Penitential Rite, p. 210, No Gloria)

L: As we prepare to listen to the Word of God, we confess that we are sinners and ask the Lord for pardon and strength.

(Brief pause)

- A: I confess to almighty God and to you, my brothers and sisters, that I have greatly sinned, in my thoughts and in my words, in what I have done and in what I have failed to do, And, striking their breast, they say: through my fault, through my fault, through my most grievous fault; Then they continue: therefore I ask blessed Mary ever-Virgin, all the Angels and Saints, and you, my brothers and sisters, to pray for me to the Lord our God.
- L: May almighty God have mercy on us, forgive us our sins, and bring us to everlasting life.

A: Amen

OPENING PRAYER

(Lent p. 46-55, Sunday Celebration of the Word and Hours or the Opening Prayer of the day e.g.)

- L: Let us pray.
- L: Grant us, almighty God,
 that through this yearly observance of Lent
 we may enter more deeply into the mystery of Christ
 and draw upon its power in the conduct of our lives.
 We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son,
 who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy
 Spirit,

God for ever and ever.

A: Amen.

LITURGY OF THE WORD

PROCESSION OF THE WORD OF GOD Process in to sung acclamation.

(The reader/s (R) with Lectionary held aloft, move from the entrance down the aisle, accompanied by ministers with lighted candles. The Lectionary is placed on the ambo and incensed.)

INVITATION

L: May the Word of God always be heard in this place, as it unfolds the mystery of Christ before us, and achieves our salvation within the Church.

FIRST READING

The First Reading of the Sunday from the Lectionary

R: The Word of the Lord.

A: Thanks be to God. Followed by silent reflection

RESPONSORIAL PSALM (sung if possible)
The Responsorial Psalm of the Sunday from the Lectionary

SECOND READING

The Second Reading of the Sunday from the Lectionary

R: The Word of the Lord.

A: Thanks be to God. Followed by silent reflection

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION (sung if possible) Stand
The Gospel Acclamation of the Sunday from the Lectionary
e.g.

Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ, King of endless glory.
No one lives on bread alone,
but on every word that comes from the mouth of God.
Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ, King of endless glory.

GOSPEL

The Gospel of the Sunday from the Lectionary

- R: A reading from the holy Gospel according to (e.g., Mark)
- A: Glory to you, O Lord.
- R: The Gospel of the Lord.
- A: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Sit

SHARED REFLECTION on the Readings followed by silence.

PROFESSION OF FAITH

Stand

- L: Brothers and sisters, let us profess the faith of the Church we received on the day of our baptism.
- A: I believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate. was crucified, died and was buried; he descended into hell; on the third day he rose again from the dead; he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty; from there he will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body,

and life everlasting. Amen.

L: In response to God's Word proclaimed in our midst we pray to God for the needs of the Church and the world

A reader announces the intentions in the usual way.

- R: Lord hear us.
- A: Lord, hear our prayer.
- L: God of love, hear the prayers of your people and grant us today what we ask of you in faith. We ask this through Christ our Lord.
- A: Amen.

PROCLAMATION OF PRAISE

L Let us praise the Lord. (Brief pause)

Left Blessed are you,

hand God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ,

side: for you have blessed us in him

with every spiritual blessing of heaven. Before the foundation of the world,

you chose us in him,

to be holy and blameless before you. For such marvellous deeds, O God, we voice our praise and sing/say:

We praise you, O God.

We are blessed to be your children.

Right In love you destined us hand for adoption as your children

side: through Jesus Christ,

according to the good pleasure of your will: how worthy of praise is your glorious grace, that you freely bestowed on us in your Beloved. In him we have redemption through his blood, and the forgiveness of our trespasses: such are the riches of your grace

that you lavished on us.

For such marvellous deeds, O God, we voice our praise and sing/say:

We praise you, O God.

We are blessed to be your children.

Left With all wisdom and insight, gracious God, hand you have made known to us the mystery of your

side: will,

according to your good pleasure that you set forth in Christ as a plan for the fullness of time: to gather up all things in him,

things in heaven and things on earth. In Christ, we obtained an inheritance,

having been destined according to your purpose, so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ,

might live for the praise of your glory. We acclaim you, glorious God, as we voice our praise and sing/say:

We praise you, O God.

We are blessed to be your children.

Right In Christ we heard the word of truth,

hand the gospel of our salvation,

side: and believed in him.

Through Christ we were marked with the seal of

the promised Spirit,

who is the pledge of our inheritance

until we come into its possession, to the praise of your glory.
And so, O God, our strength, we voice our praise and sing/say:

We praise you, O God.

We are blessed to be your children.

SIGN OF PEACE

L: Let us seal our prayer with a sign of unity and reconciliation as we offer one another a sign of peace.

[The leader of prayer returns to the body of the Church.]

[The Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion (EM) prepares for Communion.]

COMMUNION RITE

Kneel

BRINGING OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT TO THE ALTAR [by Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion.]

THE LORD'S PRAYER

Stand

EM:Taught by our Saviour's command and formed by the Word of God, we dare to say/sing:

A: Our Father...

...now and forever. Amen.

INVITATION TO COMMUNION

Kneel

EM:Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb.

A: Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof, but only say the word and my soul shall be healed.

The distribution of Communion takes place in the usual way.

REPOSITION OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT

PERIOD OF SILENCE

Sit

Stand

Considerations for music

EM:Let us pray. (e.g. Lent p. 261) (Silent prayer)

Lord,

You have renewed us with the heavenly bread that enlivens our faith, inspires our hope and strengthens our charity.

Teach us to hunger for Christ, the true and living bread,

and to live by every word that proceeds from your mouth.

We ask this through Jesus Christ our Lord.

A: Amen.

[The Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion returns to his/her place.]
[The Leader of Prayer returns to the sanctuary.]

CONCLUDING RITE

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Sit

COLLECTION

BLESSING (p. 268-269)

Stand

L: May God the Father
with the Son and the Holy Spirit,
who has shown us such great mercy,
be praised and
(make the Sign of the Cross)
blessed forever and ever.

A: Amen.

DISMISSAL

L: Let us go in peace, glorifying the Lord by our life.

A: Thanks be to God.

"The Church's liturgy moves within the cycle and rhythm of the liturgical seasons that celebrate the many facets of the mystery of Christ and salvation through the course of the liturgical year. The use of the Lectionary with the Sunday scriptures unites each Sunday assembly with the Church universal" Pastoral Handbook for the Dioceses of Australia: Sunday Celebration of the Word, Sunday Celebration of the Hours, p. 28. This cycle and rhythm of liturgical seasons should also be reflected in the musical selections for a Celebration of the Word.

"The hymn chosen for communion should speak of the meaning of the act of communion, and not adoration. The communicant is in union with Christ, and with the whole body of Christ. The hymn's text should reflect the ritual action or speak of unity and service. Texts should not give the impression that the eucharistic celebration has taken place at *this* celebration." *Pastoral Handbook*, p. 30.

As with selecting music for Mass, priority should be given to those parts of the liturgy that by their nature are sung e.g. Responsorial Psalm, Gloria (when appropriate), the Gospel Acclamation, and the Acclamations during the Proclamation of Praise. Then consideration should move to the Processional songs (Entrance, Word and Communion) and the verses of the Proclamation of Praise, followed by music for other parts of the liturgy.
